Who Owns You?

In Haggai 2:8 we read, "The silver is Mine, and the gold is Mine, declares the Lord of hosts." God owns all things, but, more importantly, He wants to own us. In the New Testament, Jesus tells us that we can't serve two masters. Either we will serve our money or God (Matthew 6:24). However, the real question is not who owns the money but who owns you!

There's a story about a missionary who was talking about the Lord Jesus to the chief of a tribe. The chief tried to impress the missionary with gifts of horses, blankets, and jewelry. But the missionary replied, "My God does not want the chief's horses, blankets, and jewelry. My God wants the chief himself."

The chief smiled and said, "You have a very wise God, for when I give myself to Him, He also gets my horses and blankets and jewelry." Do you understand what that chief understood? If God owns you, then He owns your money and everything else too.

Have you given yourself to Jesus in response to His claim on you? Do you believe that Jesus died on a cross to pay for your sins? Jesus' blood doesn't just pay for sins; it pays for you. It purchases you as God's own possession.

God already has a rightful claim to own all people and all things because He is the Creator and owner of everything. And if you trust that Jesus paid the price of your sins, then God has a double claim to own you. The Lord is your owner both as the Creator who made you and as the Savior who paid to get you back from sin. "You are not your own; you were bought at a price" (1 Corinthians 6:19b-20a).

If you reject God's claim of ownership and want to be your own person without answering to the Lord, you might think it will bring you more freedom. But it will cause all sorts of worries and problems for you, and, if nothing changes, it will eventually land you totally separated in eternity from God.

However, if you acknowledge God's claim of ownership and if you put yourself and everything you have in His hands, you will be blessed. When God owns you, your problems are His problem. Your cares are His concern. He will guide you and help you flourish in this life and for eternity. The key to financial freedom is realizing that all your money is God's, and the key to spiritual freedom and contentment is knowing that you are not your own but belong to Jesus Christ as His treasured possession.



August has always been the month of fulfilled expectations, as well as unexpected let downs. This is the month when tomatoes and peppers start ripening and are harvested, the peach blossoms that you watched way back in spring have turned into big, juicy peaches and you're watching the corn for signs of ripeness. While the season's efforts are being rewarded, sometimes the inexplicable happens. This year our corn was the surprise. After a bit of a rough start, the stalks were growing really well, but the ears had a strange flavor that just wasn't right. and we scrapped the whole harvest. oh, well . . . happens to the best of 'em.

All in all, the harvest was plentiful, despite rookie mistakes. We were able to get 733 pounds of fresh food, some of which was given to the congregation, some of which was sold to raise funds for our garden, and most was donated to our food pantry. We have plenty more growing and if the weather holds out, Immanuel's kids will receive little baby pumpkins and there's more tomatoes, sweet peppers, beets and winter squash to be harvested.

This was also the month of the end of Hillside Summer Nights fest. Immanuel, as well PYHT and OSCG were present every Tuesday, getting the word out, passing out free-bies, taking donations and making balloon animals. In my humble opinion, we did well for our first time out. Thanks to all the volunteers who showed up and helped us in our weakest moments; at the end of the fest nights and just in time to help clean up. You guys and gals were a great help.

As part of our efforts to grow food year-round, Jayne Siou has applied for a grant to help in expanding our indoor growing efforts. If all goes well and the funding shows up in time, we will be producing approximately 120 salad kits per week, complete with lettuce, tomato, bell peppers and cucumbers. 


Rise and Shine Valerie Winston
