Praise the One Who Breaks the Darkness

"Alleluia! Christ is risen!" "He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

That beautiful proclamation returns on Easter Sunday, April 17th. How exciting to joyfully praise God once again after such a long absence during Lent. I invite you to join us on Palm Sunday and that week leading up to Easter morning. During Holy Week our repentance deepens as we focus on the events of Jesus' Passion. His entrance into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday until his death on the cross and burial in the garden tomb, draws us into the details of his great suffering and sacrifice for all people. Everything will change on Easter morning. We will do a one-eighty and shout and sing and celebrate. We will "Praise the One who Breaks the Darkness" (LSB 849) and conquered death for us. Be sure to invite someone, a neighbor, a friend, or a family member that hasn't been to church in a while.

The world is obsessed with what man can provide and lately that has been very disappointing. The world's condition is like a glass vase dropped on the ground shattered in a thousand pieces. No amount of glue will ever restore it to its original condition. It is changed forever. But! Our Creator God in great love for us provided the solution, the remedy, the cure, to our brokenness. Easter morning brings us into God's space away from all the darkness, sadness, and disappointments of life.

The other day I was driving to Hillside on my morning commute. After several days of rain and dark skies, the sun was shining brightly, and I felt revived. It brought a smile to my face and a warmth in my heart. Joy welled up within me (seriously!).

When we celebrate on Easter Sunday, we are putting aside all the promises broken by the world, we are replacing it with much needed Restoration through Christ's Resurrection from the dead. In Christ God brings hope for the world. Sins forgiven and the promise of eternal life contrast the failures of daily life. In Christ, God replaces the sadness of our sinful lives with new life: *"With joy you will [all] draw water from the wells of salvation" (Isaiah 12:3).* Jesus said, *"Whoever believes in me, as the Scripture has said, 'Out of his heart will flow rivers of living water'" (Jn 7:38).* This is the great blessing we have by virtue of our new life in Christ. Allow that joy to overflow each day, especially in times of difficulty.

Our relationship with God has been restored. We who were once His enemies, are now friends. Alleluia! We can now approach our loving Savior freely and with confidence, knowing that the love of God and His forgiveness is greater than my sin. I know how difficult it has been for each of you the past couple of years. Yet, God meets you in your sorrow and suffering, in the parched desert of everyday life. He comes to you in the promise of His Word, in the forgiveness of sins in bread and wine, all to bring you times of refreshing. You have new life now in Christ, stay close to him. Listen to Jesus, "*I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing*" (John 15:5).

Let us come and worship our Risen Savior. Alleluia!

Maybe Today!

During the week before His Crucifixion, Jesus talked about the End of the Age (Matthew 24). He indicated what some of the signs of the end will be, and He described what His return will be like. What He did not tell us, though, is exactly when these things will happen. In fact, Jesus said, "...the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect." That is why, He emphasized, "Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect" (Matthew 24:44).

How would you spend your last day if you knew when it was? What would be most important to you? What would you do to "be ready"? Jesus' point is that we should spend each day as if it is the last. He told us that the *"faithful and wise servant"* is the one *"whom his master has set over his household, to give them their food at the proper time. Blessed is that servant whom his master will find so doing when he comes"* (Matthew 24:45). In this parable, Jesus is the master, and we are His servants. Whom is Jesus placing under our care?


What are those responsibilities that our Master has given us? Are they not all summed up in the Great Commandments to love the Lord our God with all our heart and soul and mind and our neighbors as ourselves? And are we not to be baptizing and teaching the Faith to all the world? 
