Nailed It!

And you, who were dead in your trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made alive together with him, having forgiven us all our trespasses, by canceling the record of debt that stood against us with its legal demands. This he set aside, nailing it to the cross. (Colossians 2:13-14)

A perfect 10. A clean sweep. A flawless victory. People aspire to but seldom achieve these goals. To do exactly what you set out to do in exactly the way you want to do it is simply perfection. And that is how Jesus Christ accomplished His mission to earn our salvation: perfectly.

He recruited the disciples He wanted, was baptized into the sins of the sinners He came to save—all of us—preached the message He wanted to preach, lived the sinless life He needed to live, and rode into the city where He chose to die. He embraced His Father's will to suffer, be crucified, and proclaim His victory in hell. Then He followed that up with a perfect ending: rising from the dead, showing His glory, and ascending into heaven. Flawless victory.

And that victory is now ours through Baptism into Christ, where we are marked, buried, and raised with Him. Those very sins that corrupted and condemned us were stripped from us and taken by Christ, who nailed them to the cross. He nailed it, and we receive the reward.

This is what the Season of Lent and the Time of Easter are all about. Ash Wednesday is February 14th, yes, Valentines Day. Let us begin this season of repentance by focusing on how Jesus nailed it for us. We will continue gathering each Wednesday thereafter with a meal at 6pm and worship at 7pm. We will meditate on St. John's Passion of Christ written in John chapters 18-19. I look forward to our time together as we prepare for Christ's victory on Easter Sunday.


Blessings on your Stewardship Journey

Channels of God's Love

Benjamin Franklin, one of our country's founding fathers, developed a challenging habit. Every day of his adult life, he set aside time to examine two questions. In the morning, he asked himself, "What good shall I do today?" As the day drew to a close, his question was: "What good have I done today?"

As Christians, it is easy to relate to Franklin's attitude because a common theme throughout God's Word is that we are to share God's love within us with others as we help and serve them. With the help of the Holy Spirit, we are called to love others as we love ourselves. In his letter to the church in Galatia, the Apostle Paul wrote, "So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith" (Galatians 6:10). God has created, forgiven, and redeemed us, and we become His instruments of love and compassion in the world. God blesses us so we can serve Him by serving others. He honors us with the privilege of being the channels through which He works.

We are blessed to be a blessing. God wants us to be His channels who live in total devotion to Him and are His faithful stewards. He empowers us to do the "good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10). The same strength that was available to Paul is available to us. As the Apostle Paul wrote the people in Philippi, "I can do all things through Him Who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13). God is our source of strength. Through our weakness, God is able to display His divine power. By the power of the Holy Spirit, we can make the serving of others a priority in our lives.




WHEN WE GIVE TO THE NEEDY AND THE POOR, WE ARE GIVING UNTO THE LORD.
